## KEEP TEACHING ANYWAY! Susan Timm

I was one of the lucky ones to complete the Portfolio workshop this academic year. As I was

trying to find a way to conclude my portfolio, I kept thinking about *The Last Lecture* and *Anyway*. I'm not sure if you are familiar with The Last Lecture. On September 18, 2007, Randy Pausch delivered a lecture that quickly became an Internet sensation subsequently viewed by millions of people. (http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ii5 MgicxSo). In return, he and his words of advice became an international media story and a best-selling book now published in 35 languages (http://www.thelastlecture.com/index.htm). To this day, people everywhere continue to talk about Randy and his ideas. (Randy died of pancreatic cancer on July 25, 2008, at the age of 47.) Now wouldn't that be a great thing—for people to say and/or write such positive things about what you have to say?! Like Randy, I (and probably you too) would like to leave behind a legacy.

In addition, some might already know Mother Teresa's *Anyway* poem. At several of our College graduations, Dr. Sam has read this poem.

Reportedly, the words were found inscribed on the wall of her children's home in Calcutta, India; consequently, the poem was attributed to Mother Teresa. However, since that time, research has uncovered that the original version of this poem was written by Kent M. Keith.

Following is my version of the poem. I've entitled it *Keep Teaching Anyway*, and it presents my "last lecture" on teaching and learning.

#### Keep Teaching Anyway!

Some days you'll wake up and not want to face the glazed looks in a classroom full of obviously uninterested students, go into that classroom with enthusiasm and try to win them over. You never know what might sink in; keep teaching anyway.

Even when you feel like only one student "gets it," teach the concepts anyway. You might make a world of difference in that one person's life. Think of the old saying, "To the world, you're only one person; however, to one person, you might be the world;" so even if only to one, keep teaching anyway.

Colleagues whom you admire, and some you don't, will make suggestions and provide often unsolicited advice that you might not completely understand or even agree with; be open to try what they say; you might just be surprised what works. So seriously take their advice under consideration, and keep teaching anyway.

When you reach out to help others, whether they be colleagues, students, or administrators, some might draw back and question your motives. Don't shy from mentoring them still; in spite of their reluctance, **keep teaching anyway**.

Even when others think you are doing creative things for your own vain ambitions, if you are doing these things to advance learning and to improve yourself and your teaching, then don't give up. Sooner or later the truth is always revealed if you just **keep teaching anyway**.

Although colleagues and administrators alike might accuse you of being unorganized (and maybe like me you resemble that remark!) or of creating a chaotic classroom, keep experimenting with those unique, often unorthodox methodologies that you think will advance learning. Others might be jealous or they just might not understand; so why worry? **Keep teaching anyway**.

When someone asks you to sign up for a workshop that is going to improve your teaching and you can't even think straight because you have so much to do already that adding another item to your plate might just push you over the edge, sign up for the workshop anyway, especially if it is one on *Teaching Portfolios* or on *Multicultural Transformation*. Even after teaching for over 30 years, you certainly will be taught something new if you go in with a willingness to learn, a desire to improve, and remember that we are still in the process of becoming. So take advantage of these teachable moments; then,

take them to the classroom where you should **keep teaching anyway**.

As Confucius said, choose a job you love, and you will never have to *work* a day in your life. If you have found this passion in teaching, then don't ever give up. Even when the students, your colleagues, the administration, and even family and friends discourage you, just pull out some encouraging evaluations (and/or read your *Teaching Portfolio*), and **keep teaching anyway**.

When you get burned out, lose your passion for teaching, and you just can't seem to find a way to rejuvenate yourself, although you have tried everything and more, have the courage to make plans to retire and to find a new path. Colleagues will tell you to keep teaching, as the task is much easier now that you've been doing it for years. They'll tell you that you will find that other ways to earn a living will be much harder. The saddest thing that I've personally witnessed is when a classroom teacher goes unemotionally through the process simply to get a paycheck. So follow your heart and retire from teaching in a classroom. However, if you don't already know this fact, you'll quickly learn that teaching extends well beyond the classroom and a profession. So when people come to you and you reach out to mentor them, remember, whether you realize it or not, you will keep teaching anyway!

## What Can Your Senator Do for You?

The three ECCFA vicepresidents are in the process of preparing each of our 26 Senators' constituent lists and will distribute those lists to the membership in June for fulltime faculty and in early September for adjunct faculty. Your senators are your source of information about what actions have taken place in the most recent Senate meetings as well as your conduit for asking the Senate to consider your issues and concerns. Senators have an obligation to communicate regularly either in person or by email with their constituents.

At the May 12<sup>th</sup> meeting, the Senate reaffirmed the practice we have followed for several years of not posting the ECCFA's financial reports on the website; in addition those reports are not sent with the draft meeting agendas that go out to the entire membership the week of a Senate meeting either. In fact, senators receive their copies of the financial reports only at the actual Senate meeting when they pick up the final agenda for that day.

Should you wish to know more about our bi-monthly treasurer's reports, you will need to contact your senator who will send you a copy in campus mail. As always, any member is encouraged to attend Senate meetings and can receive a copy of the printed agenda with attached treasurer's report at the meeting.
