ECC Library Supports Online Learning

Your ECC faculty librarians have been working to provide a variety of online help and assistance to students in all areas of study.

- On the library's web page, under Assignment Help, there is link to Research Guides which will connect students to assignment specific paths and suggestions. Librarians customize these guides according to faculty instructions. Currently, there are over 70 guides on the menu.
- 2. The final link in the list of Research Guides is called <u>Tutorials</u>. Here the student will find very brief "howto's" for performing basic library functions as well as a video to help with composing MLA citations.

- 3. Another link in the Research Guides list is *Information Literacy Lessons*. If scheduling a face-to-face basic library introduction is not possible, these brief lessons (with a review quiz) can be assigned to entire classes or to those students whose knowledge base is incomplete. Though these lessons form a complete package, they can be viewed separately. The lessons are titled

 - Evaluating Sources
- 4. Librarians are also available to help within the D2L environment through our embedded librarian service. We can monitor a dedicated forum in your D2L course site and answer any research or library related questions your students may have. It's been a busy summer! Renovation work on the third floor SRC is just finished and we now have 16 new classrooms. All classrooms are equipped as smart classrooms with new NEC video projectors. Seven are computer classrooms, some with new computers and all with new furniture. All classrooms now have amplified speakers built into the ceiling for better audio and — this is big — the classrooms now have excellent sound isolation. We have tested this with loud music and are confident that you will not be able to hear the adjoining classroom's activities.

The new Multi-Purpose Classroom facility (MPC) will be ready for classes beginning Spring 2011. All 31 classroom spaces will be equipped with smart classroom technology including the new NEC projectors.

Coming Soon – Mandatory Student Network Accounts in the Computer Classrooms & Labs

All students and faculty can now log into the classroom computers using their AccessECC username and password. This allows their My Documents data to be securely stored on the network where it can be accessed from any classroom computer or from home over the internet.

If for any reason a student is not able to log on with their student account:

- The student can reset his/her password via Student Portal on www.elgin.edu; click on the Manage Account Settings button.
- 2) The instructor can stop by First Stop or call the Helpdesk x7979 from the classroom phone for assistance.
- 3) Students should go to First Stop for assistance.
- 4) The generic user logins are still active & functional (ex: user name ICT125 & password ecc).

→ Student Network logins will be mandatory starting Spring 2011.

Academic Computing will be offering handson training sessions demonstrating the how-to's for accessing online student electronic services for faculty not familiar with their student computer accounts. We want to make it as convenient as possible to attend training by bring the training to faculty at scheduled times to be determined. More information will be coming soon.

News from the AFT, IFT

During the summer, the following information arrived from state and national union leaders. The first article is a letter from President Randi Weingarten about the AFT's reaction to a controversial new film. The second lists several initiatives and changes at the state and national levels.

Weingarten Shares Concerns over Controversial Film

I am writing to share with you the action plan we have developed in response to the upcoming movie *Waiting for "Superman.*" The movie is scheduled to be released on Sept. 24 in Los Angeles and New York, and then will be distributed in several other markets around the country. The documentary has been made by Davis Guggenheim, who directed the Academy Award-winning movie *An Inconvenient Truth*. Despite his good intentions, and despite the fact that you can't help but be moved by the film's stories of five children and their families, the movie is selective, incomplete and misleading. It leaves the impression that all public schools and public school teachers are bad, all charter schools are good, and teachers' unions are to blame for failing schools.

As you know, saving public education as it ought to be is a principal piece of our work this year, but such work must be honest and accurate. Waiting for "Superman," while creating urgency, also creates a need for the full story. Our strategy is to use free media, paid media, blogs and social networks, and grass-roots communication to challenge the shortcomings of the film. Our objective is to inject the AFT and our state and local affiliates into the public debate about the

film, and to ensure we communicate its lack of balance and accuracy. For example, never once does the film feature even one of the thousands of good public schools or great teachers. It holds out the false hope that the charter schools that are part of the Harlem Children's Zone-which receives two-thirds of its funding from private sources-can be replicated in every neighborhood across America. And as important as these schools' cradle-to-college wraparound services are-and we have been zealously advocating for them-unless the way we fund public schools is fundamentally changed, replication is not possible. In short, we have strong arguments to demonstrate that the film is an incomplete and unbalanced picture of public education.

Our effort to ensure a balanced view of the film will require your active involvement. In addition to the action plan, we have a <u>media kit on LeaderNet</u> that includes talking points, a template for an op-ed, a copy of my recent Where We Stand column and a few other pieces that will help you frame your response in the local press. I have assigned a senior team at the AFT to run the campaign. We are committing significant resources to raise questions about the film's lack of balance and misleading parts.

If you have questions or additional thoughts about the campaign, I would appreciate your sharing them with me. We have achieved great success in the last year in our fight to protect continued investments in our public institutions, and in our efforts to reform public schools from within (for example, through our teacher evaluation work). We cannot allow this movie to stop our forward momentum. Your help and involvement is critical.

The House of Representatives approved an emergency spending bill that included \$10 billion to save educator jobs and \$5 billion for Pell Grants. Now it's up to the Senate to do its part and approve the same level of assistance. It's crunch time. Contact your senator today.

AFT, IFT leaders elected at AFT convention

Delegates to the AFT convention in Seattle July 8-11 voted to re-elect the union's top officers, including President Randi Weingarten, to two year terms. IFT President Ed Geppert, Jr. and Chicago Teachers Union President Karen Lewis were elected to the national union's Executive Council. AFT advances role in teacher evaluations

After extensive discussion and debate, delegates at the AFT convention on July 10 overwhelmingly ratified a policy resolution on the comprehensive overhaul of teacher development and evaluation. The resolution calls for evaluation systems that are based on professional, clearly defined teaching standards; use multiple measures of teacher practice and student outcomes; are correctly implemented by trained evaluators; require administrators to address working conditions; and focus on supporting teachers and giving them time to work with colleagues. In her convention speech, AFT President Randi Weingarten said, "We're taking the leadership role in overhauling teacher evaluations. Developing and training teachers should be a way to support good teaching—not a 'gotcha.' "

IFT member recognized as AFT Everyday Hero

Lanise Sanders, a school nurse and member of the Chicago Teachers Union, Local 1, was named an AFT Everyday Hero at the national union's convention in Seattle earlier this month. Hundreds of members nationwide were nominated for the award based on their outstanding contributions in their workplaces and communities. One of only 11 members selected to be an AFT hero, Sanders is clearly deserving of the recognition. She is well-known in her school and community as a student and patient advocate. She led a campaign to defeat legislation that would have allowed unlicensed school personnel in Illinois to administer medication to students. Common Core Standards being analyzed

In June, the Illinois State Board of Education adopted the recently finalized Common Core Standards (CCS) for English/language arts (ELA) and mathematics for grades K-12. The CCS initiative was undertaken by states and led by the National Governors Association and the Council of Chief State School Officers. Teachers provided critical input during the development of the standards at both the national and state levels. Now, IFT members are part of a team conducting a gap analysis comparison of the current Illinois Learning Standards and the Common Core Standards. Details about the standards are available online.

COURSES PRESENTED OVER THREE WEEKEND SESSIONS IN NOVEMBER, FEBRUARY & APRIL Participants *must attend all three* weekend-sessions to complete these courses.

➢ BUILDING A POLITICAL POWERHOUSE

An effective political/legislative action program can make the difference in enacting desirable legislation, in electing public officials who support our members and in mobilizing members around local issues. This course will cover elements that go into building an effective political program, including:

- Communicating with members about political issues;
- Engaging members in our political program;
